Summer Reflections: Rooted in Extravagant Love

"I pray that you... may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ." – Ephesians 3:18

As May draws to a close and summer begins to open before us, the Church of Scotland gathers once more in Edinburgh for the General Assembly. Delegates from across the country—ministers, elders, deacons, and guests—step into the hall with hearts full of hope, concern, curiosity, and faith. Each year, the Assembly is a chance to reflect on who we are as a church, to wrestle with what we believe God is calling us to be and do, and to listen—really listen—for the whisper of the Spirit amidst the motions, debates, and decisions.

This year, the theme guiding those gathered is *Extravagant Love*. Not cautious love. Not tidy or polite or careful love. But *extravagant* love. The kind that spills over the edges. The kind that reaches further than we think it should. The kind that dares to embrace not only the loveable but the overlooked, the hurting, the complicated, the stranger.

Paul's words in Ephesians call us to grasp—if we can—how wide and long and high and deep the love of Christ really is. It's a prayer, not a conclusion. Because such love isn't easily explained. It's something we learn to see, to trust, and to live into.

And maybe that's why summer is such a good season to reflect on it.

Because summer slows us down. It gives us space to breathe. To pause between the busyness of life and ask: Where have I seen this kind of love? When did I last feel held by it? Where might I be called to show it?

Extravagant love doesn't require dramatic gestures. It shows up in the smallest of things:

- Sitting with someone in silence when words won't help.
- Offering a meal without needing thanks.
- Forgiving someone who hasn't yet said sorry.
- Making space for someone else's voice at the table.
- Choosing grace instead of gossip.
- Staying with the hard conversation when walking away would be easier.

These are acts of resistance in a world that too often runs on transaction, division, and self-protection. And they're the kind of love Jesus lived—love that took risks, crossed boundaries, broke rules, and gave itself away without demand for return.

As a church, we are invited again to be rooted in this kind of love—not just talking about it, but becoming it. Embodying it. Living lives that speak of it in ways louder than sermons and gentler than slogans.

And in the midst of this, we also look ahead to welcoming Shaw back among us later in the summer. His moderatorial year, shaped by the theme *Building Together* has taken him all across Scotland and beyond, witnessing how God is at work in places familiar and unfamiliar. We look forward to hearing his stories, sharing his reflections, and celebrating his faithful service.

But for now, summer stretches before us.

Let it be a time of rest—not just because we're tired, but because God made us for rhythms of work and renewal. Let it be a time of gratitude—for all that's blooming around us and within us. And let it be a time of love—not forced or performative, but generous, surprising, and real.

This season, may we catch glimpses of the extravagant love of Christ. And may we become part of the way that love is made known.

Thanks be to God.



CALL FOR ACTION AFTER GRUESOME DRC ATTACK.

The Christian Open Doors charity, which supports persecuted Christians, reported in May's Life and Work that 70 Christians were beheaded in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) in the village of Mayba on the 13th of February.

They state that 'the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) is part of an extremist network that wants to wipe out Christianity in the region. If nothing is done, more attacks will follow.' The group targets Churches, kills pastors and displaces entire Christian communities. According to Open Doors researchers, at least 355 Christians were killed for their faith in the DRC last year. The charity is calling on Christians in the UK to respond in prayer and action.

'We must pray for our brothers and sisters in the DRC, who are facing unimaginable horror. But we must also act. We must raise awareness, contact our MPs, and demand that the UK government speaks out. If we stay silent, more Christian lives will be lost' (Open Doors)

When we have such freedom to worship as we choose, it's hard to remember that so many are still being killed for their faith across the world.

MODERATORS VISIT TO LOAVES AND FISHES

On Wednesday 7 May it was my privilege to visit Loaves and Fishes Foodbank along with Ruth, our church secretary and the Very Rev. Dr. Shaw Paterson, our minister who at that time was still Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Shaw encouraged us to support this essential charity shortly after he began his ministry here, over 30 years ago. We have continued to do so and Lesley Davidson, Chairman of Loaves and Fishes, thanked us most warmly for our support. Lesley was able to personally thank Ruth who raised £820 by running in the Manchester Marathon in April.

It was a really interesting visit where we learnt so much about their work and

the ongoing difficulties that they face. They now provide 200 food parcels weekly in East Kilbride and Strathaven and if anyone is unable to collect they will deliver.

Despite food donations from many organisations and churches they have to buy 90% of the food they provide. If you are able to make a financial donation you can do so via the Loaves and Fishes website.
